Join us for student presentations and a panel discussion on what the Paris Agreement on Climate Change means to countries, institutions and individuals going forward

Delegates from 195 countries met over two weeks from 30 November to 11 December 2015 in Paris, France to negotiate a deal on climate change. The Paris Agreement is a landmark conclusion as it requires for the first time, all countries to submit pledges to reduce emissions up to 2030 and further subjects these pledges to five-year reviews beginning 2023. In addition, progress has been made in areas such as adaptation, loss and damage, transparency and means of implementation (finance, technology development and transfer, capacity building). While this pact is by no means perfect, many consider this the best chance to set the world on a safer trajectory in terms of climate change and its adverse impacts.

This Post-Paris COP21 Dialogue will examine what the Paris agreement means to countries, institutions and individuals going forward. We will hear from representatives from the COP21 organizer, Singapore government and the NGO sector, as well as NUS students who participated in the International Alliance of Research Universities (IARU) Global University Climate Forum which was intended to give students a voice in this global issue.
